## 2600 block of Ocean Avenue from 19th Avenue to Woodacre Drive

1. ESTABLISH - RESIDENTIAL PERMIT PARKING AREA H (Eligibility only, no signs) 2600 block of Ocean Avenue between Woodacre Drive and 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue (Supervisor District 7) (Requires approval by the SFMTA Board) Gerry Porras, gerry.porras@sfmta.com

The proposed modification would add RPP eligibility to the residents and occupants of the parcels on the 2600 block of Ocean Avenue (Except for addresses already in RPP Area H and the parcel facing Woodacre Drive) so they can purchase parking permits for their vehicle to park within RPP Area H.

## 2800 block of 24th Street between Florida and Bryant Streets

2. ESTABLISH - RESIDENTIAL PERMIT PARKING AREA W (Eligibility only, no signs) 2800 block of 24<sup>th</sup> Street between Florida and Bryant Streets (Supervisor District 9) (Requires approval by the SFMTA Board) Gerry Porras, gerry.porras@sfmta.com

The proposed modification would add RPP eligibility to the residents of the 2800 block of 24<sup>th</sup> Street between Florida and Bryant Streets (Except for 2884 24<sup>th</sup> Street already in RPP Area W) so they can purchase parking permits for their vehicle to park within RPP Area W

## 40th Avenue at Quintara Street - STOP Sign

#### 3. ESTABLISH – STOP SIGN

40<sup>th</sup> Avenue, northbound, at Quintara Street (Supervisor District 4) (Approvable by the City Traffic Engineer) Jeffrey Tom, jeffrey.tom@sfmta.com

Proposal to install a STOP sign to designate the right-of-way at this intersection.

### Randall Street and Sanchez Street – RED ZONES

#### 4. ESTABLISH - RED ZONES

Sanchez Street, east side, from Randall Street to 7 feet northerly Randall Street, north side, from Sanchez Street to 20 feet westerly (Supervisor District 8) (Approvable by the City Traffic Engineer) Juan Hernandez, juan.hernandez@sfmta.com

Proposal to install daylighting to improve visibility.

# Noe Street, from Duboce Avenue to Beaver Street - Noe Slow Street - Speed Cushions and Daylighting

### 5(a). ESTABLISH - SPEED CUSHIONS

Noe Street, between 14<sup>th</sup> Street and Henry Street (1 3-lump cushion) Noe Street, between 15<sup>th</sup> Street and Beaver Street (1 3-lump cushion)

### 5(b). RESCIND – GREEN ZONE ESTABLISH – RED ZONE

Noe Street, west side, from 15<sup>th</sup> Street to 20 feet northerly (for daylighting and Painted Safety Zone)

# 5(c). ESTABLISH – GREEN ZONE, 10-MINUTE TIME LIMIT, 8 AM TO 6 PM, MONDAY THROUGH SATURDAY

Noe Street, west side, from 41 feet to 51 feet north of 15<sup>th</sup> Street (perpendicular zone, relocated from parallel space on Noe Street at 15th Street)

#### 5(d). RESCIND - TOW-AWAY NO PARKING EXCEPT CAR SHARE ESTABLISH - RED ZONE

Noe Street, east side, from Henry Street to 20 feet southerly (for daylighting) (Supervisor District 8) (Approvable by the City Traffic Engineer) Ellen Robinson ellen.robinson@sfmta.com

Proposal to implement traffic calming, daylighting and wayfinding treatments on the existing Noe Slow Street, to reduce traffic speeds and improve visibility.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Appeal Rights under Chapter 31 of the San Francisco Administrative Code: For Approval Actions, the Planning Department has issued a CEQA exemption determination or negative declaration, which may be viewed online at http://www.sf-planning.org/index.aspx?page=3447. Following approval of the item by the SFMTA City Traffic Engineer, the CEQA determination is subject to appeal within the time frame specified in S.F. Administrative Code Section 31.16, typically within 30 calendar days of the Approval Action. For information on filing a CEQA appeal, contact the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors at City Hall, 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Place, Room 244, San Francisco, CA 94102, or call (415) 554-5184. Under CEQA, in a later court challenge, a litigant may be limited to raising



only those issues previously raised at a hearing on the project or in written correspondence delivered to the Board of Supervisors or other City board, commission or department at, or prior to, such hearing, or as part of the appeal hearing process on the CEQA decision.

Whether the City Traffic Engineer's decision is considered a Final SFMTA Decision is determined by Division II, Section 203 of the Transportation Code. If the City Traffic Engineer approves a parking or traffic modification, this decision is considered a Final SFMTA Decision. If a City Traffic Engineer disapproves a parking or traffic modification and a member of the public requests SFMTA review of that decision, the additional review shall be conducted pursuant to Division II, Section 203 of the Transportation Code. City Traffic Engineer decisions will be posted on SFMTA.com/EngineeringResults by 5 p.m. on the Friday following the public hearing. Final SFMTA Decisions involving certain parking or traffic modifications, whether made by the City Traffic Engineer or the SFMTA Board, can be reviewed by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Ordinance 127-18.
