




PROPOSAL / REQUEST: ESTABLISH – NO STOPPING, EXCEPT BICYCLES ESTABLISH – BIKE SHARE STATION 3rd Street, east side, from 42 feet to 116 feet south of the crosswalk at King Street (74-foot bike share station) (Supervisor District 6)							
Proposal to move the existing Bay Wheels bike share station on 3rd at Townsend to the floating buffer on the east side of 3rd south of King to be adjacent to the new two-way bikeway next to the Giants stadium.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION / COMMENTS  There is an existing 39-dock bike share station on the west side of 3rd, south of Townsend, currently next to a 23' vehicle lane with sharrows + parking lane.  The SFMTA will be installing a two-way curbside bikeway on the east side of 3rd between Townsend and the Lefty O'Doul bridge. It will also be removing the sharrows on the west side of 3rd and narrowing that vehicle lane + parking to 18'.  This legislation would shift the bike share station to the new painted floating buffer on the the east side of 3rd, south of King, to be adjacent to the new two-way bikeway. The station would use angled plates and shrink to 20 docks. In the 6' buffer: 4'-6" for station + bikes, 1' gap to travel lane, 6" gap to bikeway.  The new bikeway is going to be installed in March 2024, with a ribbon-cutting on March 26. This bike share station move would happen as soon as possible afterwards. 



#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) proposes to implement a city-wide bicycle sharing system in San Francisco as part of the regional Bay Area Bicycle Share (BABS) system described in detail below. The current regional bicycle share system in San Francisco is a pilot project managed by the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD). The regional BABS system will transfer to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) for program oversight at the end of 2015. As part of a BABS pilot project initiated on August 29, 2013, the system operator installed approximately 35 bicycle share stations with input from the SFMTA, comprising 350 bicycles within the public right-of-way, located generally in the northeast section of the City. The proposed project would maintain and upgrade the existing 35 pilot bicycle share stations, and expand the BABS system within San Francisco to comprise a total of approximately 450 stations and 4,500 bicycles across the City and County of San Francisco (San Francisco).

#### **DETERMINATION:**

The City and County of San Francisco decided to carry out or approve the project on December 18, 2015. The San Francisco Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved a coordination agreement with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), other local partners in the East and South Bay, and the bicycle share operator to carry out the Bay Area Bicycle Share Program, which would be overseen in San Francisco by the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) on December 8, 2015. The agreement was provided to Mayor Lee for his signature and becomes effective upon signing or when ten days have passed. This project in its approved form has been determined to be exempt from environmental review because it would result in the installation of up to 450 bicycle sharing stations throughout San Francisco, primarily within the public right-of-way and on some parcels. The proposed individual stations are portable, modular, and would be solar and battery powered, and would thus not involve excavation or utility connections. The bicycle sharing station equipment is small in scale and massing relative to surrounding buildings or sites. Bicycle facilities and infrastructure are common sights within the urban environment. There would be no potential for significant environmental impacts at either a project or cumulative level. Therefore, the proposed project would be exempt from environmental review under Class 3.
