








13TH STREET SAFETY PROJECT

Critical bicycle and pedestrian safety upgrades on segment of a corridor with 107 collisions over 5 years








MARKET STREET RAISED BIKEWAY DEMO





The bustle of Market Street provides a unique opportunity to refine innovative safety features with a diverse group of road users.



COMPLETED VZIP24 PROJECTS:

- Reduced speed limit and new signals on Sunset Blvd between MLK and Lake Merced
- Quick and effective:
 - Hundreds of high-visibility crosswalks at over 100 intersections across the city
 - Dozens of Painted Safety Zones to help improve visibility including a brand new one at Market and 16th/Noe
 - Ongoing daylighting initiative citywide to quickly upgrade visibility (including major Tenderloin effort).
