


WHAT *ELSE* IS HAPPENING FOR TRANSPORTATION IN THE BAYVIEW?

Extent: Barneveld Ave to Crisp Rd **Schedule:** Start construction late 2019, complete early 2022

Details: Repaving, new street trees, improved pedestrian lighting, new bus shelters, new curb ramps, median islands, bulb-outs, and reconfigure intersection at Silver/Quint **Learn More:** http://sfpublicworks.org/palou



Extent: Oakdale Ave to Jerrold Ave **Schedule:** Under design; construction could start winter 2020, pending negotiations **Details:** Build new connector road alongside Caltrain where Quint St was closed off **Learn More:** https://www.sfcta.org/quint

Extent: Cesar Chavez St to Hunters Point Blvd **Schedule:** Construction complete Spring

Details: Repaving, replace sewer lines, install new curb ramps, intersection improvements, new crosswalks **Learn More:**

Extent: Phelps St to Caltrain underpass **Schedule:** Start construction late 2019, complete early 2025

HOW DO WE IMPROVE TRANSPORTATION IN THE BAYVIEW?


The SFMTA has a broad "toolkit" of investments to improve transportation for people walking, riding a bike, riding on transit, or driving. What investment do you like the most? Where do you want us to build it?



Painted safety zones reduce the speed of turning cars and increase visibility of people crossing the street.



Continental crosswalks help to make drivers more aware of people crossing the street.



A raised crosswalk is raised to the level of the sidewalk to slow down vehicles. Examples are found on Hudson Ave and on Whitney Young Circle.



Accessible curb ramps help people with disabilities move from the sidewalk to a roadway, and vice versa, safely



Rapid flashing beacons provide a visual warning to drivers when someone is crossing the street.



Median islands provide protected space in the street help people cross safely. They can also help to calm traffic by narrowing the roadway.



Lighting improves safety, visibility and accessibility. Pedestrian lighting is lower to the ground, illuminating the sidewalk.



A pedestrian bulb is an extension of the sidewalk at an intersection. They increase pedestrian visibility and safety when crossing the street.



Chicanes shift position of the travel lane in the roadway to slow down vehicles. An example is on Newcomb Ave at Phelps St.



Speed cushions are meant to lower vehicle speeds on local streets.



Bus bulbs extend the sidewalk to make enough room for a bus shelter. They can speed up bus routes because the bus loads in-lane



Traffic circles lower speeds at minor intersection crossings and can include landscaping. Examples are found on Hudson St and Whitney Young Circle.



Bike routes are on low-traffic streets with no separated area for bike travel. They work well other traffic calming.



Bike racks are installed on the sidewalk and can hold 2 bicycles.
A corral is on-street and can hold up to 12-14 bicycles.



Green paint, paint buffers, or physical separation all help make people on bikes more safe and visible. Examples are found on Cargo Way.



SFMTA will soon upgrade our NextBus display system, including solar-powered displays that can be used in more locations.








PRIORITIZING INVESTMENT FOR VULNERABLE RESIDENTS:

Different vulernable populations in the Bayview face different types of transportation challenges on a daily basis.


We want to utilize the principles of Mobility Justice to center the lived experience of Bayview's most vulnerable residents in solutions that meet their needs.

The map below shows the concentration of Bayview residents most vulnerable to transportation challenges, a combination of the other maps on this board.





How will your feedback be used?


When developing & prioritizing projects, we will measure the benefit to vulnerable residents. This will decide:


- Where we prioritize transportation investments in the Bayview

 - The order of implementation for transportation projects






























HOW WOULD YOU SPEND \$600,000 ON TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENTS?

Participatory budgeting is a democratic process where community members come together to come up with ideas, develop them into proposals, and vote on where the money will go.

The SFMTA received a Lifeline Transportation Grant from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) to **improve transit** and access to transit for low-income residents in the Bayview. Projects will be developed and funded through a Participatory Budgeting process.

Community Ideas to Improve Transit & Access to Transit

In the fall of 2018, we gathered over **300 ideas from community members** for how we can improve transit or access to transit in the Bayview.

Our partners at the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and the San Francisco County Transportation Authority (SFCTA) screened these ideas for funding eligiblity. After their review, we now have **11 types of projects eligible for funding.** Now we need Project Champions to turn these ideas into real proposals!



11 TYPES OF PROJECTS - PROJECT CHAMPIONS NEEDED!

Increase MUNI Service



Greater bus frequency, more weekend service, or more buses at night are all eligible for funding.

Community Shuttles



Community shuttles
available to the public
at-large, serving key
community desitations
& providing access to
transit.

Education Programs



Marketing, incentives, and education campaigns for connecting residents with transit, especially monolignal communities.

New MUNI Service



Funding could bring new bus lines, like the Southeast Muni Expansion, to the Bayview years earlier than planned.

Transit Ambassadors



Additional Transit

Ambassadors, staffing

key transit lines to

improve rider safety,

are eligible for funding.

Paratransit & Taxi



Increased service for paratransit, Van Gogh or Shop-a-Round shuttles are eligible for funding, as well as taxi vouchers for Bayview residents.

Improve Bus Stops



Adding new bus shelters, improving street lighting around transit, installing new trash cans or installing new NextBus signs are all eligible for funding.

Free Transit Passes



Free transit passes for low-income community members, including youth, seniors, or residents with disabilities are eligible for funding.

Community Surveys



Community-based organizations can be funded to do transit surveys with residents.

Crossing Guards



Establish new crossing guards at locations near transit stops or extend the working hours of current crossing guard positions.

Routes to Transit



Better sidewalks, bike routes, crosswalks and safer intersections near transit are all eligible for funding.


